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



The captain made sure that all jobs were done. He was responsible for the ship's conduct.






What it's not: mismanagement or disorganization

bracing


These sailors got used to bracing, or securing, themselves when storms struck.



Bracing means placing oneself against a support to keep from being knocked over.


What it's not: unsteady

Think about things people do if something is pressing. Read these situations with a partner. Circle the ones are pressing.


Is it pressing?

What it's not: attentive or focused



What it's not: not having an opinion




